## **Online Communities and Forums**

- **Facebook Groups:** There are numerous Facebook groups dedicated to antiques and collectibles. These groups can be a great source of leads and potential purchases.
- Online Marketplaces: Websites like eBay and Etsy can be treasure troves for antique and vintage items.
- **Forums and Message Boards:** Online forums dedicated to specific collectibles can connect you with other collectors and potential sellers.

### Local Residents

- **Door-to-door:** Visit neighbors and ask if they have any antiques or vintage items they want to sell.
- Word of Mouth: Let people know you're looking for antiques and ask them to look for
  potential items. Put flyers in public spaces asking folks to contact you if they have
  antique or vintage items for sale or forgotten treasures from their basements and attics.

- **Barn Sales:** These sales often feature a variety of items, including antiques and vintage collectibles.
- **Junk Yards**: People sometimes dump things in junkyards without knowing what they have—fun time to go exploring, especially if the weather is nice.
